

# USTEAA(USA) Scholarship Update

Early this year, the USTEAA (USA) and the UST Office of Student Affairs signed a Memorandum of Agreement for a new 5-year Scholarship Grant for incoming freshmen of SY2018-2019. It is the goal of the Association to maintain 3 scholars in a given school year.

The 2017-2018 academic year has been another successful year for all of our scholars and the organization as a whole. All scholars attained grades beyond the minimum GPA required to keep their scholarship grants.

On June 7, 2018, Jazinda Ira Capati, our 5th year ChE major scholar graduated Cum Laude and ranked 2nd among her graduating class of 2018. Once again, Rei Gene Villarosa was awarded a Certificate of Recognition and a medal during the Engineering Week last February 2018 (celebrating the 111th anniversary of the foundation of the Faculty of Engineering), for ranking top 3rd in the Dean's List. Rei will undergo On-the-Job-Training for 240 hours with EEI Corporation. Ivan Madlangbayan will train with Texas Instruments Philippines as part of the school curriculum.

Aquiles Mariano, familiarly known to friends and family as Les, graduated in 1964 with a Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering from the UST College of Engineering.

Shortly after graduation, he was employed by San Miguel Corporation as a Process Engineer at the Farola Container Division. He was responsible

for providing technical engineering support in the manufacture of glass containers, and the injection and compression molding of plastic containers. It was also in this job that he trained in the principles of Project Management.

With a strong desire to further his education, Les decided to migrate to the United States in 1967. Setting foot in Chicago, Illinois, he soon gained employment as a Technical Service Engineer at a facility manufacturing civil and military communications equipment. Pursuing his ambition for further education while gainfully employed, he applied and was accepted into the MBA evening program of Northwestern University in Chicago. For this degree, his focus was in operations management and statistical analysis.

With his technical experience and capable management skills, Les built a thriving career in the employ of companies that provided services in the engineering and construction of process facilities. In various job positions throughout his career, he competently applied the principles of project controls on the engineering and construction of such facilities as phenol plants, ethylene plants, oil refining, facilities for the production of polypropylene, vanillin, ethanol or oil, gas-fueled and peat moss-fueled power plants, co-generation facilities, and pharmaceutical plants producing vaccines and cholesterol-reducing drugs. In a number of these positions, Les was called upon to work overseas assignments in places such as Finland, Ireland, England, Singapore, Venezuela, and Mexico.

Currently, Les is Director of Project Controls for a privately-owned company. His main involvement at the moment is in the construction of a facility for consumer beauty products.

Les has been a member of the USTEAA (USA) since 2006. He also has been a twice-tenured President of our association. He is a consistent and enthusiastic supporter of USTEAA through steady involvement in the activities of the association. Currently, Les is a member of the USTEAA Board of Directors.

On the personal side, Les married Lidivina Pineda Mariano in 1969. Nini, as she is known to friends, is also a graduate (1966) of the UST College of Engineering and an active member of the USTEAA. Together, they have two daughters, Cherie and Nancy, who are both married and blessed with a son and a daughter each.
