From the Editor's Desk: Service the USTEAA(USA) Way...

The long cold winter of 2016 extended herself up to mid-April. But the 16th of April proved to be different. The warmth of spring greeted our day!

Eighteen pairs of hands arrived at the Community Food Bank of New Jersey. All were eager to do whatever they could to serve. USTEAA members led by President Les Mariano, included Nini Mariano, Toots Ciocon, Joey & Kathy Lozada, Rey & Fe Maximo, Alice Coco, Dick & Cita Tibay, Mol Barredo, Rosanne Silvino and Evelyn Masaoy.

Friends and family also came to lend their helping hands. Alice Coco was joined by her husband Robert, Mol Barredo came with his wife Jaycee, Cita & Dick arrived with their engineer twin daughters Ria and Rio, and a friend Joyfen Tolentino.

We started by lining up on both sides of what looked like a long warehouse table. Zipped plastic bags were stacked at one end of this long table. Instructions were given on what to pack and how to pack certain stuff.

Our able-bodied gentlemen carried the boxes of food from where they were stacked near the wall to the long table. They then opened the boxes and emptied them on the tabletop.

The assembly line started with those who unzipped the empty plastic bags. It ended with those who constructed three dimensional boxes out of folded flat cardboards and filled them with the bagged food.

The plastic bag, now stuffed with goodies, was passed on to the bag sealers who deftly sealed each bag. This, they passed on to the box-fillers. The latter carefully counted and placed each bag into the box. Finally, the box was closed and lifted from the assembly line to the pallet.

The eighteen pairs of able hands loaded up 3 pallets of 24 boxes each, containing 15 bags per box. Thus after about two hours of work, our group was able to put together 1080 breakfast bags. This we did amid the fun, the banter, the laughter and the smiles!

Soon ... somewhere ... sometime... these bags will satisfy the hunger of 1080 kids who would otherwise have spent the day in school without a meal. ■

Updates from a Grateful Scholar

Greetings to my USTEAA Family!

My name is Mary Grace L. Casuncad, USTEAA(USA) Scholar, schoolyear 2008-2013.

Since January 2014, I have been working with AMH Philippines, Inc. where I currently hold the position of Design Engineer. My first assignment was in the field of Water Resources Engineering. Most of my work was involved with land developers who were performing their Technical Due Diligence (TDD), which is mainly divided into: Hydrologic and

Hydraulic Study, more commonly known as Flood Study, Geotechnical Assessment and Geohazard Assessment.

Our group of interns was made to rotate within the different fields of engineering. This gave us much exposure in performing functions related to Hydrologic and Hydraulic Study.

After 6 months on the job, I was transferred to the structural department, where my projects have so far been mostly in the design of reinforced concrete water retaining structures such as those utilized for the operations of Maynilad and Manila Water Company. I was assigned as a civil / structural designer for multiple structures at a time.

At the start of 2015, while continuing my assignment as civil / structural designer, I was designated Technical Project Coordinator for a team performing the detailed engineering design of Fort Bonifacio Sewage Treatment Plant. The scope of our work for the said project covers all the areas needed for detailed structural, civil works, sanitary, geotechnical engineering design and construction assistance. We are working alongside M.E. Sicat Corporation under a Design and Build contract. We are looking forward to the project completion by late summer of 2016. This project I am working on has taught me a great deal towards the understanding of how the different fields of engineering interact and how each field forms a piece of a puzzle which exists as a part of a greater whole.

All these would not have been made into reality without the help, support and generosity of my USTEAA(USA) Family; the constant aid and reminders of Engr. Evangeline Deleña; and the mentoring by Engr. Les Mariano. I am also very thankful to Engr. Cita Tibay who has regularly kept in touch with me. I hope very much that I will be able to visit my USTEAA Family in the near future.







It's What Friends Do
